Journey with God's Word Third Sunday of Advent

Matthew 11: 2-11



The Word of God comes to us to awaken our hearts.

Mt 11: 2-11

In prison, John heard in prison what the Messiah was doing and he sent word by his disciples and said to him, "Are you the one who is to come, or are we to wait for another?" Jesus answered them, "Go and tell John what you hear and see: the blind receive their sight, the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have good news brought to them. And blessed is the one who takes no offense at me."

As they went away, Jesus began to speak to the crowds about John: "What did you go out into the desert to see? A reed shaken by the wind? What then did you go out to see? Someone dressed in soft robes? Look, those who wear soft robes are in royal palaces. What then did you go out to see? A prophet? Yes, I tell you, and more than a prophet. This is the one about whom it is written, 'See, I am sending my messenger before your face ahead of you, who will prepare your way before you.' Amen I say to you, among those born of women none is greater than John the Baptist; yet the least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he'.

- 5. Jesus holds John in high esteem? What does he see in John?

Read the text again and reflect and share on **some** of the following:

- 1. "Are you the one who is to come, or are we to wait for another?"
 Who or what do we wait for/deeply long for?
 What it is like to wait for someone or something?
- 2. "Go and tell John what you see and hear... "
 Who like Jesus points to what is happening in our lives?
 In our culture? In the world around us? In our Church, etc.
- 3. "What did you go out in the desert to see? What draws us into the desert? What might we discover there?
- 4. John is "...more than a prophet".
 Whom do we hold in respect?
 What is it about them that evokes our respect?
